

Holy One, be the light in our darkness this day, that we might reflect your light into the dark corners of our world.


And this particular year, hold all those who have suffered the loss of one of their own these last days, hold them and grant them grace and comfort even in the midst of tears.......

Still, a lot happened in 2020, even with the doors closed. Have a look!






What Happened in 2020

Pastoral Charge

- * Updated all financial matters to electronic operations
- ♣ Bookkeeping converted and maintained digitally by Gord Gallaugher
- * Adapted changes in staff to volunteers during COVID, post office, paying bills, filing, tracking all monies, gifts, grants etc.
- * Applied and received TEWS, Temporary Emergency Wage subsidy, and CEWS Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy
- * Renewed our formal partnerships with First Line for Syria and Partera International
- ❖ Initiated a new partnership with Muslims of Dufferin and Faith Immigration who will be working to sponsor up to 15 refugee families
- Offered parenting workshops, yoga classes, and meditation gatherings during the spring and summer to the community
- * Paid for families to attend parenting classes in the summer and fall
- * Supplied food cards, gas cards and telephone cards to those in the community in need as well as emergency benevolent funds distributed
- Provided crisis care/ministry of introduction to community resources
- * Continued to work on our visioning for both churches

- * Contributed to the Shelburne Hamper Project with items, finances, manpower, and use of our Trinity space in December
- * Offered a Lenten study, both in person, and on line with Seven Sacred Pauses, the practice of dividing the day into times of praise and gratitude.
- * Offered a study both in person and on zoom of Practicing Compassion by Frank Rodgers
- * Established connections for all social programs offered in Dufferin, and following cancelation of on site gathering, are building this on the website for public use
- * Similarly, building a resource for understanding the anti-racism movement, palliative care and spiritual practices to be fully launched in January to be shared in our immediate community and beyond
- * Commissioned and launched a professional, interactive website
- * Our email correspondence is opened by between 85 100 homes weekly
- * The website has had 2100 unique viewers since its launch in early summer, and they have viewed just over 8,000 pages
- ★ Designed, delivered and posted 40 podcasts since the churches closed, analytics suggest there are between 100 - 150 listeners a week, as well as 900 downloads on Apple and Spotify since it began.
- ★ Mastered the tricky business of recording the choir over technology - thank you Maestro Bruce and the SPPC for all your efforts - more to come in 2021



- Great effort expended creating, visioning, writing the church hub profile for the Pastoral Charge/Search Committee
- * Search Committee meeting regularly to review candidates for new leadership in 2021 not an easy task during a pandemic
- * Re-opening committees formed in both churches, monitoring protocol updates
- * Continued to develop care groups in both churches
- ★ Updated and purchased office computer phone system, furniture for pastoral charge office
- Painted both offices and initiated refurbishing them with grant monies, cleared out office cupboards, files, and stored legal documents
- * Created and prepared lay leadership for 2021 until new minister is in place
- ★ Budget drafted for pastoral charge for 2021
- * Council met four times, to meet again in December to plan budget for 2021

Primrose United Church

Held smaller services in congregants' homes from January through to mid March

- * Offered several outdoor services in the summer when weather permitted and indoor services with protocols in place
- * Offered special, palliative care to Loretta Foster
- ♣ Pastoral Care leaders maintained regular connections to 40 families throughout COVID.
- Delivered Mother's Day flowers to our community
- cookies for care group members living on their own
- * Sept. 12th had a social distanced fall plant sale (Shirley, Sharon, Bev and Gail)
- * Oct. 3rd had a Vintage/Antique Sale (Gwynn, Faye, Phyllis R.) with left leftover knitted lap blankets donated to nursing homes
- * Nov. 28th hosted a Christmas Market (Gwynn, Faye, Phyllis R.) with donation to food bank and leftover items donated to new mothers (through Shelley D.)
- * Meditation Garden has been maintained and cared for throughout the spring, summer and fall for the community's pleasure (Bev P.)



Trinity United Church

- * Finished up the furnishing of the YBH room with new carpet, table, and window blinds
- Cleaned and repaired flooded bathroom downstairs
- * Replaced minister and office windows to bring them up to environmental standards
- * Ordered new front doors on Owen Sound street entrances to bring them up to environmental standards
- ♣ Did a full environmental audit of the building, commissioned and received a complete working drawing of the church footprint
- * Replaced old boilers with new energy efficient ones
- ★ Organized shared office space with the Catholic Church for their bookkeeping practises
- * Welcomed Shelburne Towne Fitness to teach classes in our spacious basement this fall
- ❖ Offered yoga and spiritual meditation classes in the YBH Room in November and December through Shelburne Town Fitness who have been so careful with pandemic protocols
- * Repaired and upgraded elevator to meet compliance standards
- ♣ Drafted a new Structure for Trinity Church Council, (approval Spring 2021)
- ♣ Pastoral Care leaders reached out and maintained regular connections to 80 families throughout COVID.
- ★ Co-ordinated with the Shelburne Hamper Project and Shelburne Family Chiropractic to offer space for toys and shoes to be organized and collected in our sanctuary and basement for the Hamper project
- * Hired new custodian
- * Council met 10 times





Some Important Year End Reports

Search Committee Chair, Karin Klouman

Our committee has been very hard at work; meeting every 2nd week for most of the year - and then this fall we renewed our efforts further and started having weekly meetings. We have carefully reviewed well over 260 profiles of potential candidates and have sent out personal invitations for further discussion with approximately 60 of these. As a result of further correspondence back and forth (as well as phone-calls) we eventually have ended up doing a handful of interviews.

Currently we are talking to two rather promising candidates and we are starting the 2nd round of interviews with them both in the first week of January. The ongoing search for a new minister has been an interesting process, at times rather challenging, but also immensely rewarding. We look towards the future with prayerful optimism and give much thanks for the support and encouragement we have received.

For many of us, the only time we would see one another has been in church on a Sunday morning, where we chat over superb coffee and exquisite treats. But, for some of us, with some of our 'sheep', we are finding ourselves in conversations we never imagined, conversations that cross borderlands of age and history.

Two of our shepherds are new arrivals—by comparison to those whose time here spans generations, who skied to one-room school houses, who tell stories that bring the landscapes around us to life, whose ancestors built our little church—depths not usually plumbed during coffee hour. We relay news to Candice when particular care and prayer are warranted; we talk by phone and most of us have lambs whom we have been able to visit in person, on the porch, in the garden while delivering fun things or flowers, or goodies, as well as love and prayers.


Being fiscally prudent, we will monitor our financial situation as we hopefully re-open in the Spring and continue to seek new ministerial leadership. We look forward to

Environmental Upgrades Full Steam Ahead! The church doors may be closed but the church environmental upgrades are ongoing and nearing completion. The old boilers have been replaced with state-of-the-art technology, and the drafty exterior entrance doors for the Sanctuary will be replaced with new insulated doors. We have experienced delays with the doors due to building permit and supplier issues, but they are expected to arrive and be installed in February. The Visioning Committee has submitted our follow up report to Faithful Footprints and we have received \$29,000 of the \$30,000 grant monies so far! The Visioning Committee wish to extend our utmost thanks to everyone that has supported this greening initiative and especially to those that have stepped up and contributed financially. These upgrades were long overdue, and without your

unwavering support, projects of this magnitude are very difficult to undertake.

Our Plan Going Forward in 2021

As Karin Klouman has advised you in her search committee report, the search for new ministerial leadership is well underway, and has been in process for the year. Karin and her team are doing a thorough and thoughtful job seeking out a good match for both congregations, someone who will offer intelligent theological reflections and tender pastoral care, and at the same time be able to continue on the extensive visioning work both churches have undertaken. As you may well imagine, this is a challenging endeavour given the changing face of ministry, the diminishing number of seminary graduates, the number of ministers retiring, and the added complications due to the pandemic. In order that the search committee can continue to focus on their job, a nine month plan has been put in place to keep everything on an even keel until our churches open up physically again and/or you have new spiritual leadership in place. It is primarily lay led, with the addition of specific short term contracts and the possibility of visiting ministers in the future. It can both transition easily to new leadership, and/or be extended if need be. Here is an outline of this plan that has been approved by both councils individually and by the pastoral charge collectively.

Administrative Work: Ann McAlpine, Gail Brown, Mary Hawthorne, in co ordination with both the treasurers and of course the on going supervision of Ann Harbridge

Financial Business: Jamie McAlpine (Treasurer Trinity, Pastoral Charge), Fran Braiden (Treasurer Primrose), Gord Gallaugher (digital book keeping and monthly reports, Trinity and Pastoral Charge)
Trustees/Property Trinity/Primrose: Will continue on as before, working closely with financial as well.
On Going Pastoral Care: Geraldine Sherritt (Trinity), LeeAnn McKenna (Primrose) oversee the individual care groups at each church, collectively looking after 120 families plus. They will be touching base every two months, able to distribute newsletters, congregational updates, and special gifts to keep in touch with those not using technology.

Newsletter, Annual Report: Linda Moore and Ann McAlpine will look after these in the new year, important tools for keeping everyone connected and informed outside of the website.

Crisis Care: A list of serving ministers in and associated with our church have agreed to be on stand by for funerals, weddings, counselling of various kinds. Ann, Gail, Geraldine and LeeAnn will have this list to work from.

Sunday Worship/Spiritual Leadership: Candice has assembled a list of suitable resources for Sunday morning, including more traditional streamed services as well as less traditional podcasts, link sources, films, magazine/podcast sources. She will be working with Sabine Rohner Tensee (Primrose) and Darlene Morrow (Trinity) so they can choose each week something suitable, both traditional and less traditional, for the congregation to consider. Please make every effort to keep tied in with them.

Website/Social Media Presence: Colin Simmons, who designed the website, has been hired to continue with all the weekly website postings, facebook, instagram (new), and email correspondence so you will continue to be informed all that is going on digitally. A template has been designed so that the information he needs each week will be sent to him on a regular basis from the various sources.

Councils: Councils will continue to meet when necessary. Trinity is proposing a simplified council for 2021. Gail will call council when necessary. ***Our zoom account is available to all council members, and in fact, all members of the church.

Ministry and Personnel: Ed Crewson and his team will continue on as before, though for the moment they are in a holding pattern.

Visioning Groups: will continue on their own and to meet when needed.

Message from Candice

I might as well admit to being good and weepy these last couple of weeks. I have been busy trying to put things in order for the new year - so many details. But somehow I keep thinking of all of you and really and truly how I will miss you all.

People think that the minister's job is to provide Sunday service, attend meetings, be there for hospital visits and pastoral care when needed. And each minister will have strengths and weaknesses in the various areas of administrative, teaching, care and so on. Some ministers will be liked by some and found wanting by others. And in this way, a minister's job is always an impossibility for it seems all we ever do is balance too many balls in the air, invariably dropping several throughout the day. At least that is what is seen on the outside.

I don't think that is really the minister's job at all. I think the minister's job is both simpler than that, and more important. The job of a minister is to stand in the middle of the spiritual chaos that is this world and hold their heart open and tender, without regret, or fear, or reproach. It is to hold steady when everything around seems to make no sense, when all the world shouts as loud as it can that God is no more than a fake imaginary friend and that Jesus Christ is not on the invitation list to the party. It is to say, as Martin Luther did, 'Here I stand.' And then to love those who are shouting, to minister to the hecklers, and to keep their eyes on the divine source of all goodness and love that is God, and never flinch. And in this way, they model all that is needed for those who wish to follow in the way of Jesus, the way of compassion, the way of love, grace and peace.

This is, of course, an impossibility.

But what helps make it seemingly possible, and encourages a minister in this strange pursuit, is the never ending kindnesses of their congregations, the moments of tender conversations, the knowledge of thoughtfulness extended to those within the church proper and to those in the larger community, and most especially the endless graces that are extended towards themselves. And in this, I have been much, much blessed during my time at Shelburne Primrose.

As I leave, I take all those blessed moments with me, dwelling as they do in my heart.

Wishing you, each and every one, a truly joyous Christmas season and all manner of wonders in the New Year.
