Finally, you the people, please spread the news! All are welcome to come to church, Sunday mornings. Primrose at 9:15 am, and 11 am at Trinity.





## News About the People in Our Congregations!



#### Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council

Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council met Friday, November 18 and Saturday, November 19, 2022, via Zoom. We were welcomed by President Mark Laird and began our meeting with worship based on the scripture: Matthew 18:19-20, "Where two or three are gathered".

The purpose of the meeting was to connect, support and transform while discussing the work of the church. In our breakout groups we discussed what helps us focus on God and what helps us to not lose heart. Following the worship service based on our theme we were shown a video of General Council 44. The commissioners to GC 44 had their meetings via Zoom starting six months before the actual conference took place again via zoom. They indicated it was very interesting, but they missed the personal touch of being able to gather together. We viewed videos from the various commissions. If you wish to see a full written report from the various commissions, please contact me and I can provide it. You do not have to be the elected representative (like me) to serve on a commission and each commission would be happy to have some help. "Where do you feel called to serve?"

We had another breakout session where we discussed how we are getting restarted and what we are doing in the community.

On Saturday morning there were comparisons as to how much snow had fallen; nothing to 12 inches! Good thing it was a zoom meeting!

We had a short welcoming worship and then we carried on with a breakout room of "What helps keep you calm?" & "What more do you need?" Often, we need a time to reflect, to pray, to have patience, to probe for more understanding and find a common ground. The 23rd Psalm is a calming source.

During our time together we had In Memoriam, recognized community of faith changes such as closures, name changes, amalgamations, and collaborative ministry agreements. As well we celebrated those who are retiring this year.

Brianna Baker, minister in charge of Stewardship gave a presentation reminding us of the resources available. 'Call to be a Church' is a free resource at the United Church website: unitedchurch.ca The bookstore ucrdstore.ca" also has many resources. <u>churchx.ca</u> is a new e-learning resource. Check it out!

John Neff of the Covenant Commission reminded us of the tool kits available.

Anne Reuber representing UCW presented a short video of the work the UCW has been doing over the past while and what went on at the 60th anniversary celebrations this past summer. Other commissions had short videos of their work. There were close to 130 participants at each session. Rev Jennifer Irving was introduced as our president elect. Jenn is the daughter of Glen & Mary Laverty.

I am looking forward to our next WOW meeting to be held May 26 – 27, 2023 in Port Elgin at the UNIFOR Centre. Plans are to have a hybrid format: in person and via zoom.

#### First Line for Syria Update- Christmas Newsletter.

As the fall is coming to an end, we can report that our family is doing well and adjusting fine to life in wintry Canada. Finally, there are now official ESL classes in Alliston and the parents are signed up. They go every single day, and their English is improving vastly. They must walk to classes, which takes a good half hour each way, but they bundle up and face the Canadian winter with good cheer. Once Ahmad is fluent in English, he will then also be working - and hopefully also get a car, but for now the parents are concentrating on ESL. This advice has been given by all settlement advisors. The hope is that this will ensure their future is better, in that Ahmad eventually should be able to find a good job, and not have to work for minimum wages.

Our sponsorship period for our family has now officially ended, so we are no longer contributing to them financially. Instead, they are getting a very minimal amount from welfare to tide them through these next few months. Sadly, this is nowhere near enough (only covers about half of their monthly rental payment). Thankfully our family is very good at money management and hopefully this situation will only last for a short time.

The money we have set aside in our bank account is earmarked for the next two families' arrival and sponsorship. It must therefore remain there, so that we can prove to "Immigration, Refugee and Citizenship of Canada" that everything is ready for our next families. We have, however, not had any further updates from IRCC in this regard, which is so very frustrating for us - and for their relatives here. The two other families have now been lingering in the appalling Azraq refugee camp for the past 9 years(!), which is a horrifying situation. We are praying that we will get some news in the new year, so that these extended families can finally be reunited.

The Al Diri children in Alliston are doing well in school and the parent teacher interviews gave glowing remarks on everybody's progress. The oldest daughter, Fatima, is volunteering at a local church's used clothing bazaar and the oldest son, Dia'a, is volunteering by helping little kids learn soccer-skills, every weekend. Malak, (the 2<sup>nd</sup> youngest daughter), was selected for her school's volleyball team and Alla'a is on the high school soccer team. So far there have been no reports of the previous year's bullying of the high school children.

Although we are no longer financially responsible for our family, we continue to stay heavily involved. Several of our FLFS members are helping with driving to and from doctors' appointments, taking them grocery shopping, going on school field trips, sports events and for hikes – as well as having them for gatherings in our homes. They have become our good friends and are truly enriching our lives. This fall we took them to Niagara Falls on Thanksgiving weekend, also to a farm tour, plus we celebrated their one-year anniversary with a fabulous potluck get together at Jeff and Sabine's home.

We are blessed by the continuing support of Shelburne Primrose Pastoral care. Without you, we would not be able to do this incredibly important and most rewarding work.
