## News from the Minister

Spring is right around the corner. At least, this is what it feels to me. I can smell the earth waking and look impatiently for the new sprouts of green to show their heads to the warming sun.

Easter and its promise of new life are also just a couple of weeks away.

The story begins "*Early in the morning, while it was still dark…." That's* where Easter begins. It begins in darkness. It starts with fear, bewilderment, pain, and a profound loss of certainty. The creeds and clarifications we cherish nowadays came later.

What came first were many variations on the same theme: hope amid struggle. As in: here's what happens when ordinary people brush up against an extraordinary God. Here's what it looks like when broken, hungry humanity encounters a bizarre and inexplicable Love in the half-light of dawn.

When I was growing up, the key Easter fact to proclaim was that Jesus rose — physically, bodily, literally — from the dead. As long as I believed it, I was safe. Later, as an adult, I encountered other versions of the Easter narrative. The resurrection was a metaphor in these versions — not a literal, historical fact, but a potent symbol of transformation, renewal, and rebirth. Whether or not Jesus physically rose again didn't matter — his friends and followers experienced his continued presence, and that was enough. The fact is, the resurrection happened in total darkness. Sometime in the predawn hours of that Sunday morning, a great mystery transpired in secret. No sunlight illuminated the event. No human being witnessed it. And even now, two thousand years later, no human narrative can contain it. It exceeds all of our attempts to pin it down because it's a mystery known only to God. Whatever the resurrection was, its fullness lies in holy darkness, shielded from our eyes. All we can know is that somehow, in an ancient tomb on a starry night, God worked in secret to bring life out of death. Somehow, God enacted transformation and new life from the heart of loss and misery.

That is the promise we live with and for, every day. Amen.

# First Line for Syria Report Spring 2022

First Line for Syria has had a very busy few months, making sure our new family has all the support they need while adjusting to life in Canada. The father has passed his G1 drivers test and is now learning to drive, an important step towards finding work and becoming fully self-sufficient.

The parents are quickly learning to speak English. FLFS members are tutoring them twice weekly, and another retired ESL volunteer teacher is coming in once weekly. (There is still no local and official ESL program available "in person").

We also have now arranged for dental care for our family, some of the adults and children needing very urgent attention. The children are now enrolled in the healthy smiles program. We have also managed to locate and enroll them with their own family doctor.

The children are adjusting well to school, and all are learning English very quickly. Sadly, the high-school children have been exposed to some very serious bullying as of late. We have been trying to work with the school administration, councilors and the parents as well as the children to support our newcomers as best we can - through a very difficult time.

We are also enjoying our social time with our family. During March break we arranged a maple sugar fest tour- complete with pancakes and syrup- plus taffy, followed by a gathering at the Barr-Klouman household where we celebrated birthdays, had cupcakes with hot chocolate, played games and interacted with puppies. A great time was had by all! Otherwise, our refugee family has hosted us for several deliciously home-cooked Syrian meals at their house.

Our fundraising effort to bring in the next two brothers and their families is steadily ongoing. We are happy to report that through various donations we now have enough funding to immediately welcome the first family; any time the final paperwork has been completed by the IRCC. The generosity of charitable foundations, friends, family-members and our two congregations has simply been amazing! Recently we were the most grateful recipient of a substantial donation from the Lawrence Schafer foundation, which is bringing us even closer to our final goal.

The "caring with Coffee" campaign was also a huge success. Thanks to all the SPPC members who supported this! Our next fundraiser will be samosa sales – starting this May hopefully. Stay tuned for updates in this regard- it will be posted in our weekly SPPC newsletter! We are also planning to hold a silent auction event this summer. If you have any services and/or particularly interesting items to donate, please contact either Karin or Sabine.







Rev. Valerie Moves to Town


