# TUC (Trinity United Church) News----"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens....." Ecclesiastes 3:1

The TUC council meets once per month except for July and August. We did meet this July because of business that needed to be addressed. We meet on the second Tuesday of the month. We currently take turns chairing the meetings. We rotate the position of chair on a monthly basis. We are still seeking a permanent Chair so if you are interested in this position, please speak to a Council member.

We received the sad news at a Pastoral Charge meeting in the spring that Primrose United Church did not have enough money to continue after this year. This news effects TUC because Primrose pays a portion of the Minister's salary. Through discussion with Valerie, our Minister, and Ann Harbridge we had a Pastoral Charge meeting in June to discuss a new partnership with Primrose and Dundalk United Church. Each Church received the information, went back to their respective churches to discuss the possibility of a new Collaborative agreement.

Trinity United Church had a congregational meeting on Sunday, July 9th, chaired by Ann Harbridge to explain the process and respond to questions. We had a vote, and it was passed to move forward with this process. Each Church has 2 representatives to attend meetings to discuss a new Collaborative Agreement. We were pleased when Ed Crewson and Shelley Doney agreed to be Trinity United Church's representatives. We had a meeting on Sunday, September 24th led by Shelley Doney and Ed Crewson to discuss as a Congregation the priorities moving forward as a Congregation. The Council is very grateful to Shelley and Ed for taking on this project as we carve a path forward.

Minister Valerie Vande Wiele took 4 weeks of well-earned vacation this past summer. On July 9<sup>th</sup> we had a short service and Congregational meeting chaired by Ann Harbridge. July 16<sup>th</sup>, we had Reverend Joyce Kelly along with her son-in-law Gary Heaslip. August 27<sup>th</sup>, we had a hymn sing of 21 favorite hymns submitted by congregation members. September 3<sup>rd</sup>, we did not have a service as it was the long weekend.

On September 20<sup>th</sup> we received the sad news that Reverend Valerie Vande Wiele is resigning from the Shelburne-Primrose Pastoral Charge. Her last day will be December 21st. We have not met as a Council to discuss our next steps. Our next Council meeting is Tuesday, October 10th. We may be forming a search committee. If you are interested in joining the Committee, please speak to a council member.

On Wednesday, September 27<sup>th</sup> we received a request from Primrose United Church stating they would like to amalgamate with Trinity United Church. The next step is for Trinity United Church to have a congregational meeting to vote on this request. We plan to have a Congregational meeting on Sunday, October 22<sup>nd</sup> to vote. Please attend, your input is important.

There will be a Christmas Eve service on December 24<sup>th</sup> led by the Choir. If you would like to participate by reading some scripture, please speak to a choir member.

#### **Trinity United Church Congregational Meeting Minutes**

#### September 24, 2023 - 11:15 a.m.

Shelley Doney welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order. An attendance sheet was circulated. A package was circulated containing questions to consider, the Trinity 2023 budget, the Pastoral Charge 2023 budget, and a summary of other Trinity expenses.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the future of Trinity United Church. Shelley asked the congregation for their input, knowledge, and ideas. Trinity has three sources of income: rental income, fundraising income, and donations. Shelley asked those present to think about how they can help. Can you help fundraise, can you give more, will you go on PAR?

According to the United Church of Canada, one church closes per week in Canada. A church is more likely to thrive if the church has a full-time minister. In our Western Ontario Waterways region, 40% of the churches do not have a full-time minister. What support can we give to our Church? What support can we give to our minister?

Shelley Doney and Ed Crewson met with Rev. Ann Harbridge, and representatives from Primrose United Church and Dundalk United Church to discuss ways of collaborating with each other. The representatives from each church were sent back to their own churches to gain input from their congregations.

Shelley presented four questions to the congregation: What does it mean to be a church? How important is this church to you? What is essential for you as a congregational member? What can you give up?

The congregation was asked to provide answers to these questions, and the answers were recorded on chart paper. A summary of the answers will be included as an attachment to the minutes.

Ed Crewson spoke on finances. He referred everyone to the budget information in the handout. In 2023, the total Pastoral Charge budget is \$135420.00. Trinity has 94 members and Primrose has 32 members. Therefore, Trinity pays 74.6% of the total or \$101023.32 annually, and Primrose pays 25.4%, or \$34396.68 annually. Trinity also has other expenses such as region dues, building maintenance, utilities, insurance, and caretaker wages. In 2023, Trinity is running a budget deficit of \$24000.00. Primrose has announced that they can no longer pay their share of the Pastoral Charge expenses. Ed thought the solution would be simple. If Dundalk could contribute \$30000.00, Primrose could contribute \$15000.00 and Trinity could contribute the rest, our expenses would be met. In return, our minster would be shared with Dundalk. But with the resignation of Rev. Valerie Vande Wiele, this solution will no longer work. Trinity cannot support a full-time minister on their own. We must consider other options. What can we give up, who do we want to work with, can we give more? Do we want to work on our own or work with other churches?

In order to inform all members of our situation, these minutes will be circulated in the October 2023 newsletter. The meeting was adjourned at 12:20 pm.

#### First Line for Syria Update

Our Al Diri family is doing well and adjusting to life in Canada, while hoping they will soon receive news that their extended family will be arriving here.

The 4 younger Al Diri children, (Alla'a, Fatina, Malak and Noor), are all doing well in school and the difficulties the high-school kids experienced when they first arrived seems to have subsided. Alla's is on the high school soccer team and enjoying this and Fatina is really enjoying grade 9. The 2 older children (Fatima and Dia'a) have graduated high school and are looking for full time work so as to eventually be able to afford starting college.

Summer has passed in the blink of an eye, and the Al Diri's were busy sharing a garden with Karin and Wally. They also slaughtered some meat-chickens, raised free-range by Wally, so that our family could be reassured the meat was Halal. It was an interesting experience for us to help them with this and we noticed the respect and prayer that went with each chicken, graciously giving thanks for each bird's life.

We also had some social visiting over the summer, spending Canada day with our Syrian friends and taking a day to be together at Canada's Wonderland, with the children enjoying the rides and the waterpark. Ruwaida has now passed her driver's license, which will make life easier for the family. Dia'a will take his next test this October.

Otherwise, the parents are both studying ESL and making great strides. Ahmad worked at a steady job at a Halal butcher shop through the summer but is hoping to soon be so proficient in English that he can apply for a welding job, which was his profession in Syria. We have a volunteer from the Rosemont Church congregation who will start up soon to help them with their ESL homework. Rosemont United church also gave us a sizeable donation this summer, which we were very grateful for.

We are anxiously waiting for news regarding the arrival of the further members of the Al Diri's family. They have now been sitting in the Azraq refugee camp in Jordan for over 10 years and although they have technically been accepted to move forward with the final stages of the refugee processing there seems to be an enormous backlog.

We are so grateful for the continuing support of the church-community. Without you, we would not be able to do this rewarding work. If anybody else wishes to join First Line for Syria we could use more volunteers! The coming two years will be very busy with the hopeful arrival of our next two families.

Hey, Trinity and Primrose United!!!

The Shepherd's Cupboard has had a VERY busy summer!!! We are thankful indeed for the Thanksgiving season as many food drives begin which will help fill the shelves and allow us to continue to serve the approximately 300 families we currently serve.

Did you know - we are in our 33rd year of operation?

- we are totally volunteer run and donation dependent?

- 68% of our clients are from the town of Shelburne with the remaining 32% from Melancthon, Mulmur, north Amaranth and north Mono?

- that we deliver to medically fragile seniors once a month?

- that we respond to emergency calls within 24 hrs?

- that every 4th Thursday we take a mobile Seniors Market to the four county run buildings in Shelburne with fresh produce, bread, milk, eggs, cereal, etc.?

- that we are open 51 weeks of the year – on Wednesdays and Thursdays?

- that 43% of who we serve at the foodbanK are children, 20% are seniors?
- that neighbour is not a geographical term but a moral concept?
- that you can donate thru Trinity United and get a tax receipt?
- that we weekly do food rescue at No Frills, Foodland, Starbucks, and Cob's Bread?

### **Discipleship and Justice Commission**

On September 18, I attended an Orientation Day at Listowel United Church for WOW executive and Commission members in the morning. Each commission held their own meeting in the afternoon. It was great to see people in person.

Our commission will soon be receiving applications for Mission Support Grants. We will have to discern our way through them and award monies to the groups. In the past, we awarded grants to many (but not all) applicants. WOWRC Mission Support Grants were awarded to the Grey Bruce Spiritual Care Council, the University of Guelph Ecumenical Campus Ministry, Camp Menesetung, Camp Bimini, Five Oaks, and the HUB Youth Network. As Mission Support funding from the national church has decreased, these deliberations are proving to be increasingly challenging.

We undertook, alongside D&J Commissions from Antler River Watershed and Horseshoe Falls, to champion our regional council's engagement with the Remit process regarding space for an autonomous Indigenous Church within the UCC. Cathy Hird, one of our commissioners, has organized this effort, equipping a team of liaisons to connect with WOWRC pastoral charges. This work will continue until the March 2024 deadline for Remit votes. If a pastoral charge does not register a vote, it will be considered a NO vote.

With the changes coming to our church, I would suggest that you take the time to check out our region website - wowrcucc.ca. If you look under Resources heading under "A" you will find an excellent resource on "Amalgamating- the steps to beginning well". Well worth a read!

I will be at the fall region meeting, via Zoom, September 28-30.

On September 26, the Primrose United Church congregation voted to seek amalgamation with Trinity United.

Amalgamation is like a marriage – two congregations commit to becoming one, with promises exchanged, sharing of assets, setting new goals, and learning how to blend their separate lives into a new shared existence. It is not a merger, or simply one congregation being blended into another. Instead, it is the birth of a new congregation, a new identity, formed by joining two communities of faith together. While communities of faith may decide to amalgamate for many reasons, often one or both has discerned that they simply cannot continue to carry out their ministry alone. It is time to do something new.

The Trinity Council is calling a congregational meeting to discuss and vote on the proposal.

We need a minimum of 10 members present.
