MINISTER'S REPORT

This last year has been a challenging one, though not without its moments of delight.

The world feels an uncertain place, unsteady and searching for direction. In the larger landscape outside our churches, humanity struggles to right itself, the post-modern period one of disruption, as are all times when a shifting worldview leaves us without a common narrative, a common story of humanity that reflects our everyday experience.

This larger shift is felt in the Christian churches in general, and in ours in particular. In an effort to understand both the deep longing for spiritual nourishment that flourishes outside the church proper and the shift away from religion as a system of doctrinal beliefs, we have been trying to see Jesus as a person before he was ensconced in the Christianity that claimed him as leader and built its theology around his astonishing thought. This has required some rethinking of old patterns of understanding our faith. Change, it is said, is the only constant in life. And it should be remembered that Christianity has been in flux since its inception, as are all things that are living, organic constructs.

Desirous to find a sustainable future our two visioning groups have spent time studying other churches and charities that are also trying to find new ways to serve the community. We attended the Re-Imagine Conference this last fall in Hamilton and have received support from Embracing the Spirit, a part of EDGE. EDGE is a branch of The United Church of Canada that "joins hands with those willing to take a leap into the promise of God breaking open the church, breaking into the world. EDGE is a living web of new and renewing ministries and leaders in the power of the Spirit,

following Christ, embracing God's mission in the world." We are working closely with EDGE and Embracing the Spirit, a new learning network and funding body within EDGE. Rob Dalgleish, the Executive Director of EDGE will be our guest for on June 7th, which is Trinity's Anniversary Service.

As the visioning groups and the councils of both churches think, meet, discuss and lead the way forward, what is required from all members and adherents of our churches is a complete rethinking of what it means to be a follower of Jesus, what it means to have the spirit of Christ indwelling. From our traditional Strawberry suppers and yearly concerts to the Primrose Plant Sale and our Christmas Eve services we should be asking the questions constantly: How is what we are doing reflecting the life and teachings of Jesus the Christ? How are we representing him? Do we view the world through a lens of compassion, and then reflect that same compassion in our actions and words? Do we serve with an open and generous heart, not thinking of our own self-preservation, either individually or as a church, but rather, to a heart that serves the other without thought of recompense or reward? How are we following God's call to live from a place of justice, loving kindness, and humility?

This last year we have lost many beloved friends in our church family. The loss is keenly felt when we gather for our councils and Sunday services. The list of deaths in our rolls seems impossibly long, the number of funeral lunches that were prepared over the year were many.

But out of the ashes of things that are passing, the spirit of Christ is always alive looking for a new place to gather, a new place to offer sustenance, a new place to sing. I encourage all of you to look for what is alive in your faith, what holds you steady and hang on to that through our times of change.

This is the last year that I will be with you. We have a stellar search committee that have been tasked with putting together a new leadership cohort. They have the intelligence, imagination and willingness to think outside the box as they search for leadership that can address these changing times, and the challenges they present. I have every confidence they will bring you competent and inspiriting new leadership as you look toward a new era in your pastoral charge.

Know that every time you make the effort to come to church on Sunday, to support events, to attend meetings, to tithe on a regular basis, to give of your energy and time to the church, we are all blessed. And this is a wonderment to me. The Christian faith holds its sacredness not in a building, or in a lectionary or even a sacrament, but deep within the hearts of those who know its value and carry within them the treasure that is divine gift. I am deeply grateful for each and every one of you and the contributions that you make. And a particular note of gratitude to our two hard working Clerks of Session, Gail Brown and Ann McAlpine for their constant care and excellent leadership as well as the heads of all the many groups and committees who so regularly attend the meetings that guide us forward.

May the many graces that have already been gifted to us continue to flourish, and may we hold steady and strong through the winds of change that surround us.

First Line for Syria

2019 began with a large gathering at the Barr-Klouman home, celebrating all the newcomers in our midst- with over 40 people coming together to enjoy the New Year. Our various local refugee-families shared what was the best experience for them about their new life in Canada, and what was the most difficult. There were some poignant moments as many of our newcomers opened up

about their journey from war-torn Syria (and Iraq) to Canada.

Our group continued to support our family by driving them to ESL and also by including our sponsored family in various other local gatherings, such as various family BBQs, local performances and concerts - and also the annual Pioneer Picnic at the Rohner-Tensee's homestead.

Helin again finished her year at ODSS as an 'honour-student' and continued to take a leadership role in her school community.

Several members of our group also took part in various interfaith activities in 2019 plus we continued our support of -and dialogue with- many of the other local refugee sponsorship groups.

A major change for our little group occurred in that our family decided to move to London Ontario, so as to be more involved in the blossoming Kurdish community there. In late August we, therefore, all gathered at Candice and Bruce's home for a wonderful potluck goodbye-party with many of our newcomers being present for this large and happy event.

First Line for Syria was helpful in assisting our family in moving and several of us accompanied them to their new apartment in London and helped with the unpacking as well.

Since our family has moved, we have continued to offer our support and have stayed in close touch with several of us making the trek to London for visits. Our family is adjusting well to life in London and Helin is keeping very busy; working after school in order to support the family's increased living expenses. Helin is also maintaining a strong academic average at school and has recently applied to Western University. We look forward to

what the future will hold for this amazing young girl!

Our group is furthermore investigating the possibility of sponsoring Sabah's youngest sister as she would like to join her family here in Canada. We have encountered a roadblock in this effort as she does not have the proper refugee paperwork, however, this issue is being resolved.

We are otherwise in touch with United Church headquarters regarding sponsoring Mohamed Aldiri's brother and wife plus their 6 children, who are still lingering in terrible conditions in a squalid refugee camp in Jordan. They now have finally moved up the list enough to receive an "official number" - and so we are hoping they will eventually get clearance to come to Canada sometime later this year. Their children are still not receiving any formal education and life is generally really difficult. Sadly, our Canadian government is now moving exceedingly slowly in their screeningeffort of new refugee applicants from the Middle East. First Line for Syria has some money set aside for the hopefully upcoming event of this new branch of the Aldiri family arriving, however, fundraising will have to be a priority for us this coming year. We will have to pay for the whole family's transport to Canada, plus all their living expenses for a full year. We are hopeful that our local two congregations will continue to support our work with refugees as First Line for Syria will obviously be taking on even more challenges in the upcoming year.

Partera Peacemakers International

Twenty-nineteen was an unusual year for Partera in a number of ways. Two of the trips this past year were for the purposes of professional development, one to Palestine, the second to the

Canadian School of Peacebuilding in Winnipeg. Both of them were rich experiences; the information was very helpful to our work. The Pastoral Charge hosted a well-attended presentation and discussion on the trip to Palestine.

A trip to Cali, Colombia, was part conference and part training. The Partera contribution was a training, conducted in both English and Spanish for a group of 60 people enrolled to learn about 'Our Violent Scriptures: What's a Christian Peacemaker to do?'

Fewer international trips made room for Partera Local events, which included seven workshops, four of those held at Trinity, two Anniversary events, a presentation to the Orangeville Lions Club and a presentation and discussion entitled. 'Confessions of a Settler on Stolen Land'

'Dickens of an Evening' was successfully staged at five churches, including Primrose. Planned/hoped-for trips in 2020 include (1) Uganda with South Sudanese refugees struggling to maintain peace in the world's largest refugee camp, (2) Ecuador, (3) the Philippines, and (4) North East India. Our first fundraiser—*Music & Magic!*—is on Saturday 28 March. See Partera 2020.

It's difficult to reduce this work to a list of where, what and how many. The Pastoral Charge provided income tax receipts for Partera's Canadian donors, space for the four workshops and the Primrose church for Dickens. Twenty-twenty is shaping up to see a lively engagement with our church partners.

Rural Response

Family Transition Place is expanding and has established their Rural Response Program at their newly renovated Shelburne office in the Mel Lloyd Centre, entrance A. This program, which seeks to

eliminate some of the barriers rural women face when trying to access services, has grown from one, to now two mobile Crisis Counsellors who are able to meet with any woman in Dufferin County seeking support with unhealthy or abusive relationships – wherever they're most comfortable. Counsellors who can support ongoing counselling, family law, housing, or substance use concerns are also available to Shelburne and surrounding Counties. Shepard's Cupboard Foodbank

The Shepherd's Cupboard Foodbank has been serving the Shelburne area for almost 30 years. Born out of the faith convictions of area churches and with the generous support of people from the local area, a team of 40 volunteers and board members have endeavored to keep the doors open and the food shelves stocked, a feat that is increasingly more difficult as numbers of users continue to rise. Loosely housed under the umbrella of the Shelburne Ministerial and directed by a board of directors which has representatives from area churches and other interested people, the mandate of the Shepherd's Cupboard is to assist people in Shelburne and its surrounding areas with their food needs, providing a 3-5-day supply of food. Clients can access the foodbank once a month and must provide proof of residency and dependents, income and bills. The foodbank is not a licensed charity and so 100% of donations are put back into the community. The foodbank is housed in the Mel Lloyd Centre and is open Wednesday's 12 noon - 1:30 pm and Thursdays 6:30-8:00 pm.

We continue, as a community of faith, to express our concern and care for those in need through our support of this important work. We are grateful that most of our volunteers belong to local church congregations and appreciate our partnership with them. PROPERTY REPORT

During this year the church has undertaken to improve and change a few items. The pulpit area floor space was enlarged to make more room for the "Primrose has got Talent" production, and this temporary addition will stay in place for the time being. The extra room helps when the choir is on stage and it should help out during the plant sale. The sound system was upgraded with a new amplifier and microphone. This new equipment has made a world of difference in the sound quality and was well worth making the change. The exterior of the original wooden structure was given a fresh coat of paint at the end of the summer by David Shirley Construction. This company also cleaned out the rain gutters in the fall after all the leaves were down.

On December 16th a testing company from Guelph (Lex Scientific Inc.) came in and collected a number of air samples. They collected the samples from both inside and outside of the building, and they also drilled a hole in the floor to collect a sample from under the floorboards. They are testing for any signs that we have a mold problem. They said it will take a few weeks to get back to us with the results. As of January 20, 2020, we have yet to hear back.

PRESBYTERY REPORT

Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council Report for 2019

It was exciting to attend the first Council Conference since 1925 and to be part of the Western Ontario Waterways region in Port Elgin from May 24th to May 26th.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the guiding principles of Connecting, Supporting, Transforming and to encourage, empower and help each community through the trials of change. A Model of Governance, to be reviewed in 2020, was presented and all 138 pastoral charges were required to do a self-assessment. The second Regional Council meeting was a one-day meeting held in Fergus on November 16th, 2019. The purpose was to establish the procedures by which the regional council conducts business and to clarify and confirm the way in which decisionmaking takes place. The transitional appointments will be re-evaluated by elections at the Council meeting to be held in Port Elgin, May 29 to 31st, 2020.

The Commissioners for the region will include the Cape Croaker and Saugeen United Indigenous ministries and attention will be given to diversity of gender and age, racial and cultural identities and

sexual orientations. It was an honor to represent Primrose United Church during this time of transition within the United Church of Canada.

PRIMROSE PARTNERSHIPS Meditation Garden Report

The Meditation Garden continues to flourish though we more and more depend on paid labour. This needs to be factored into our budget. We continued our membership in the International Quiet Garden Movement for 2019.

In July we raised \$500. from the sale of Hostas, many donated by Fran Braiden, and Iris. Many thanks go to Fran, Sharon Holmes and Shirley Farnell for making this happen.

The garden could generate more revenue for the church if a separate plant sale of perennials only were held a few weeks after the Mother's Day Bake and Plant Sale, when more perennials would be available.

We are working towards self-sufficiency in the Meditation garden. In the meantime, we are requesting \$1500. In the budget for Garden upkeep and maintenance.

Sept 24, the Garden Committee held a luncheon meeting at Main St Café in Shelburne at 10:30 followed by lunch at noon to chart and plan direction for the Meditation Garden in line with the new visioning for the church going forward. As well as committee members, any interested were encouraged to attend. It was well attended with 8 people in attendance.

It was felt that the Meditation Garden was an asset to the Primrose United Church and fell within the parameters of the Visioning of the United Church of Canada. However, it needs to be more visible and more useful to the community. It was agreed it needed to be enlarged to accomplish its outreach goals.

Christine Gracey, Landscape Architect, attended the Garden with Sharon and Beverly and outlined a plan to enhance the meditative aspects of the Garden and make it more of a destination while ensuring the increased size of the Garden does not mean an increase in the amount of maintenance required for the Garden. This would of course need labour and money to implement.

Although we had some very capable and willing volunteers from the church this summer, we still found it necessary to pay several people to weed and mulch the Garden. We also paid Kathy Krar to put the Garden to bed this fall. As she did an excellent job, we recommend she be asked to help maintain the garden in 2020.

Another solution for maintaining the Garden would be to open the Garden to volunteers from Trinity and the community at large.

PROPERTY REPORT

This year has been another busy year for the property committee in ensuring that our facility remains safe, functional and comfortable. Elevator & boiler maintenance, fire safety, landscaping, snow removal and general repairs are just some of the things that we look after.

This year the Property Committee completed the second portion of our exterior betterment project with the relocation of the historic bell which now sits with prominence at the south side of the church. In the Spring, new gardens and park benches will be placed adjacent to the bell to

emphasize our desire in connecting with the community. We also undertook some interior energy efficiency and hospitality improvements to the small room in the basement which the Visioning Committee now refers to as the "You Belong Here (YBH) Room". I want to specifically acknowledge Guy Richardson for his assistance in successfully completing this room, Wayne Ferrier for the new harvest table and the Congregation for their financial contributions and unwavering patience while we undertook the renovations.

Looking forward to 2020, our existing boiler heating system will be replaced with a new reliable energy efficient system. The existing system is at the end of its lifecycle and is no longer a system that we can consistently rely on. We have signed a contract for its replacement at a cost of \$30,000 and the Visioning Committee is aggressively seeking out funding through various granting bodies in order to partially or fully fund the capital costs of this expenditure.

This large meeting of three regions - Western Ontario Waterways, Antler River Watershed and Horseshoe Falls -in southwestern Ontario brought over 500 people to the Unifor Family Education Centre for an inspirational and informative weekend. For most of us it was an experience that was almost overwhelming in its size and possibilities. (Western Ontario Waterways Region encompasses Grand Bend, across to

Georgetown area, northward to Wasaga Beach, up to the tip of the Bruce Peninsula and south to Grand Bend.)

Separately each region had some time to conduct business. WOW Region elected Gary Clark as our inaugural president after a spirited election process. The keynote speaker, Cameron Trimble, used flight analogies to help us understand how fear and lack of vision hold us back while mission and trust move us forward. She also stated that "Earned Trust is earned over time; granted trust is granted when we agree to let people try something". VISIONING REPORT

The Visioning Groups met individually and together 10 times this last year and through those meetings we have developed a "working" Mission Statement, it reads, Our Mission is to become a sanctuary for compassionate care and spiritual nourishment by creating a fully integrated community hub partnering with all those who desire, as we do, to bring grace and generosity of spirit into this world. We seek to engage the spirit through enlightened education and interfaith gatherings and nourish the spirit through creative engagement with a wide variety of art forms. We desire to offer compassionate care locally to the immediate community by companioning with them through the various stages of life, and to extend that same care into the wider world through socially active initiatives that deem all people to be of infinite value.

With this mission statement at the forefront of all our work, we have applied for and received two grants this last year, both from Embracing the Spirit, \$2,500 to help with our experiment in the You Belong Here room, and \$25,000 for technology, office upgrades and Human Resources to form a good working unit at the center of the developing hub. It is important to work in contemporary, fresh, warm spaces, that are clean and offer modern technology, therefore we feel it a priority to upgrade the office spaces and washrooms, offering gender neutral washrooms, a family washroom and an area for nursing and changing infants and toddlers. Five of us attended the Re Imagine Conference in Hamilton this last fall, and at this conference we obtained resources which led us on many road trips, individually and collectively, to understand what other churches who are reimagining themselves are doing. We were connected with a group who meet once a month online and are being taught about new revenue streams for churches, and how to make

the church financially and socially viable. To round out 2019 we collectively reviewed over 30 possible grant applications for improvements to our building and supporting and experimenting with new ministries.

Our Plans for 2020 are ambitious and align with our vision to create a community hub in Shelburne, and they require engaging many people from outside our "congregation." We are working on a \$30,000 grant from Faith and the Common Good with their 'Greening of Sacred Spaces' program. We hope that receiving this grant will help Trinity bring itself up to modern environmental standards with our windows, heating system, and insulation standards. Also, we are in the process of engaging Samantha Irwin as a grant consultant on retainer for a year to apply for the larger grants while she advises us on the smaller ones. We are engaging Garth, the individual who completed our drawings for the stair project, to complete a current footprint of the church and then to work with us on our vision of redesign, which will include reinventing the kitchen, washrooms, office space and large Sunday School room. Finally, two people from the visioning group, are now on the search committee, where they will be visioning for new leadership, bringing with them an understanding of the many possibilities available to a church that is forward thinking.
