Reflection, Philippians 4:4 -8, from <u>Thanksgiving</u> <u>Podcast</u>, October 22th

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if

there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

So, here is Paul, sitting in prison – and they were pretty dank cells back then, nothing cushy about them at all – and he writes to a small emerging group of people, men and women, who are trying as very best they can to make sense of what is going on in the world and to follow the teachings of Jesus.

Think of the context.

Jesus has been crucified. The disciples are working as itinerant preachers, mendicants – beggars. They are trying to tell the story of what it meant to them to live and work and learn from this person, Jesus, who was from Nazareth of all places. Nazareth was a place scoundrels gathered, a place that did not have a high standing in the culture of that time, a back water. What good could come from Nazareth the people of the day asked? What indeed! But here is Paul, encouraging this little group of people to do what in the middle of the grave uncertainty. Be joyful? He is living in the uncertainly of his life and death. The uncertainty of theirs – for Christians and Jews alike were being punished, crucified, vilified, shoved about, mocked, disparaged. They were the outcasts of society. They had no place in society. No fancy buildings. No scriptures. No doctrine.

They were simply a group of people who had decided to follow Jesus and his way of love that included everyone. That extended grace to everyone. That embraced everyone. That forgave everything.

Paul's words to the church in Philippi in the early first century are the same words that I offer to you in the year 2020, when things are unsettled yes, but certainly not any more unsettled than they were to those of the emerging Christian faith so



long ago. Paul knew what he was asking. And he asked with the certainty that it would bring contentment to people. And so, it does, and so it will.

Partnerships

Search Committee

Our search committee has been meeting regularly, scouring through hundreds of applications to find new leadership for the pastoral charge. With the additional complication of the pandemic, it has not been an easy task. Interviews on zoom have proved helpful. But it is still a daunting task to find someone suitable who is both capable of leading traditional worship and managing the ongoing vision to a collected commons - the model that the United Church is proposing to churches who wish to continue to serve their neighbourhoods in all their complexity. Visioning

You may recall that the pastoral charge visioning group received a grant from Embracing the Spirit last year. <u>Embracing the</u> <u>Spirit is a branch of the United Church</u> that is supporting churches trying to reimagine their future. We received the grant for the purpose of upgrading our technology, developing a proper, comprehensive website, experimenting with various initiatives that were local to the church, upgrading and modernizing the office space, and getting guidance with our technological capabilities. Shortly after we had put several initiatives in place, COVID arrived and they were cancelled, though we did offer some things to the community on line. As the churches appear to be closed for some time, we are moving those initiatives into resources on line. They should be in place by the end of the year, offering on line help for everyone in the community, as well as a wealth of information for new leadership. Both churches continue to ponder the challenge of buildings requiring numerous upgrades and upkeep. At Primrose the visioning group is working with the the property committee exploring a wide range of possibilities. Trinity recently received an environmental grant to replace the boilers, though we are still fundraising to complete the project. (See Fundraising)

Website/Social Media

A <u>new website has been developed</u> by Colin Simmons that includes a calendar, weekly blogs with a podcast, items to read, links to pursue. For those without immediate access to technology, this is a great loss as it is hard to keep informed about what is going on in and around the church without that central website connection.

The newsletter does touch on most items of importance, but it is still challenging. If you are reading this newsletter and do not work on a computer, you may have a child or grandchild you would be willing to show you the website from time to time when they visit. It is easily found. There are several people in our church who listen to the podcasts when their families visit. They can be heard on any smart phone or portable computer. So next time you have a visitor, you might explore this possibility.

Financials

May thanks to all those holding steady with tithes and offerings. It is so very appreciated. And a special thank you for the additional generosity in our Thanksgiving Gifts. Both churches are holding steady financially, though understandably it is a challenging time for our pastoral charge. Without weekly gatherings, there is a decline in revenue. At Trinity there is the additional challenge of the loss of our steady rentals. Our pastoral charge treasurer, Jamie McAlpine, has been able to access some financial assistance to offset these losses. Primrose has done some creative fundraising to help balance the books as well. Gord Gallaugher is now looking after our digital accounting. And Fran Braiden continues to keep things running smoothly at Primrose.

But as we head into the year end, with the Christmas season in front of us, there is certainly a need to consider our giving. Our Mission and Service offering from the pastoral charge is a long way off from its budgeted goal. And you will note under fundraising, that Trinity requires \$12,000 to complete the environmental upgrades that are needed to ensure the \$30,000 grant from Faithful Footprints. Last winter the boilers at Trinity needed replacing. Michael Hofman and the visioning group worked hard to secure a \$30,000 grant for the boilers, but it required that we ourselves invested \$15,000 in up grading our building to decrease our carbon footprint. Report from Mary Hawthorne, Western Ontario Waterways Presbytery Representative

The fall regional meeting of <u>Western Ontario</u> <u>Waterways</u> opened on Thursday, October 15th via zoom.

A financial session was held earlier on Tuesday evening, October 13. Each of our sessions had an inspirational worship time based on the theme "Honey From the Rock". The Rock being the pandemic and the Honey the blessings we have gained. We covenanted with UCW as they had not been recognized previously on the regional council. Throughout the course of our meetings Thursday through Saturday The Mission and Discipleship Commission, the Covenant Commission and the Human Resources Commission each presented a video outlining the their work. Dave Jagger gave insights on Stewardship. We were also addressed by the Moderator, Reverend Richard Bott, with an inspiring message. We had breakout groups to meet others and discuss items. Sometimes technology was challenging but we all learned to cope with the changes required. Per session numbers ranged from 150-175 people at the zoom meetings.

We recognized: 3 new Candidates for ministry, 5 Retirees, 10 Jubilants who have served 50 years or more in ministry, 6 In Memoriam, and 4 Communities of Faith that have disbanded. All who had expressed interest in serving on commissions were acclaimed to those positions. Rev. Mark Laird was acclaimed as president elect for the Western Ontario Waterways Region.

Motions that were passed by the Regional Council;

1. That all procedural matters on the agenda be looked after

2. A remit – "The Order of Ministry shall be open to both men and women" to be changed to "The Order of Ministry shall be open to persons of all gender identities"

This Remit will be voted on by all 16 Regional Councils across Canada before Dec.31, 2020. It requires a 2/3 majority before it proceeds to General Council.

3. That Regional Council adopt the Affirm Action Plan and ask the Executive and Commissions to report on how the Action Plan impacted their work at the fall 2021 meeting of regional council.

4. That we receive the financial statements for 2019 and 2020 year to date.

The Auditors report for 2019 has not yet been completed as it is very complicated dealing with 3 presbyteries becoming one region. When the Auditors report has been finished it is to be sent out after it has been approved.

5. That we adopt the 2021 budget as presented.

6. That we name PWC (Price Waterhouse Coopers) as the auditors for 2020.

7. That we allow the executive to deal with all upcoming work as required and to close off the meeting following celebration service on Sunday.

Sunday morning worship was at Avondale United Church in Stratford with Rev Keith Reynolds giving the message. As well the three Ordinates: Rekekah Duncan, Gail Fricker and Kellie McComb were welcomed into the Church.
