CONGREGATIONAL Meeting on Sunday, July 9th at 11 am

On April 25, Primrose Church shared with us that they had enough money to cover expenses for approximately ten months, not including the popular fundraisers they do each year. The Pastoral Charge would dissolve if Primrose cannot afford to stay open. After that meeting, conversations ensued, and we met on Tuesday, June 6, with representatives from Trinity United Church, Primrose United Church and Dundalk United Church and Reverend Valerie. Ann Harbridge and John Neff, Minister, and Congregational Support for Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council, were also present. They explained to us how different agreements/clusters have been formed with multiple churches so they can stay open. Each agreement is unique to its situation. John Neff meets with church representatives in the cluster and facilitates agreements. It is suggested that there be two representatives from each church. If there are more people, it takes longer to reach an agreement. For the agreements to be successful, some points are essential:

The congregation must be in agreement.

Each congregation will still be unique and continue to offer activities relevant to their respective communities.

The agreements are reviewed after 1 year to check in and discuss whether it works. This information is being shared with the Congregation, so you know what is happening. Please plan to attend the Congregational meeting on Sunday, July 9th, at 11 am.



Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council

Rev. Valerie and I headed to the Unifor Centre in Port Elgin on a lovely spring day, May 26, 2023. After checking in and finding our room we headed to the assembly hall for the opening worship based on our "Dreaming Dreams" theme.

Rev Valerie will outline the upcoming Category 3 remit.

Jacob Shaw works for the cluster of six churches starting with himself and a student minister. The minister now is looking after the six churches on his own as the student was gone with Covid. Lay leaders are there to help. The core element of this bold discipleship is a minister available for all the meetings. Each church maintains its own autonomy and governance. The pastoral council consists of two or three members from each church. There are benefits to this arrangement. The financials are easier to bear. There's a bigger, talent base; it's much easier to work with confirmation of youth, and it is easier to develop a Sunday school curriculum. The individual churches support the endeavors of their cluster churches. Of course, there are challenges as the ministry personnel are stretched to cover the services and pastoral care. Once a service/slide presentation is prepared, it will work/can be adapted for each of the churches and can be shared without a minister being there. Jacob is able to sit on two ministerial groups in his area and can share with other congregations what works for him.

Since we are always looking for volunteers to serve on any of our commissions, there was an appeal made to fill vacancies. Several indicated their willingness to serve.

Following grace, we were served a bountiful supper in the dining hall. We had the opportunity to meet with the WOW President, Mark Laird, President elect, Jennifer Irving, and the commission chairs.

We had a nice vesper service with a bonfire outside on a lovely evening.

After a bountiful breakfast the next morning we were welcomed back to hear our moderator's inspirational taped message. Following the opening music and prayers, Adam Creswell, who is involved with HUB at a church in Kitchener, spoke of their work, which is to live in right relationship with people; connect the young and the community where all are welcome. This was started by a group of camp counselors, who wished to continue their work during the rest of the year. Presently they are involved with working with youth and advocating for a proper plan of housing and the chance to inform and connect with those in the community. They are always in need of leaders, who are willing to challenge and build relationships and partnerships, to help the youth.

Tim Reaburn and Sarah Charters from the UCC Foundation indicated that there are grants available to help with indigenous work, justice and inclusion work, youth programs, music programs, tech support and student scholarships.

Following a break, we were introduced to the ministry candidates; Stacey Mortson, who is serving at Rosemont, Craig Bartlett, and Wonder Chimvinga. These candidates for admission to United Church each gave a short video presentation. Craig Bartlett had ministered for another church in Korea and China and Wonder was ordained in Zimbabwe. Mary Savage of Guelph, talked about "Forest Church", a story of deep spirituality. The group meets twice a month in the Arboretum at Guelph University at 1 PM on Sundays, where they encounter the divine presence in outdoor experiences. The questions to ask were: Can we use outdoor experiences? How can a "Forest Church" be adapted to our situation? We had the In Memoriam, Lifecycle Changes in our Community of Faith, the anniversaries and recognized the Jubilands of our region.

After grace and another filling lunch, we were welcomed back to a video by Brenna Baker who gave us information on stewardship programs. There are videos and programs available from the United Church. After the courtesies, and the covenanting with the newly elected executive and commission officers, the meeting was closed.

When we had arrived at the meeting, there was a packet of coloured paper strips on our table with the enclosed instructions challenging us to create a star. These were used to create star trees/mobiles, which were given to each of the candidates that were recognized at the celebration of ministry service.

The worship services and the music for all the meeting were nicely designed by a small group of talented people including Jennifer Irving.

We stayed for the celebration of ministry service where Stacey Mortson was ordained and Craig Bartlett, and Wonder Chimvinga were admitted to the United Church of Canada.

The new WOW President, Jennifer Irving, will preside over the fall meeting the last weekend of September. The next spring regional meeting will include 3 regions gathering at the Unifor Centre May 24th to 26th, 2024.

A bag lunch was provided by the kitchen for all delegates who attended the celebration of Ministry service. The food was excellent. Thank you for the opportunity of attending this regional meeting.

WOWRC Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council

At the end of May, Mary Hawthorne and I attended in person the Spring Meeting of the Western Ontario Waterways (WOW) Regional Council.

One of the pieces we started working on is a Level 3 Remit on Establishing an Autonomous National Indigenous Organization in the United Church of Canada.

A Level 3 Remit is a proposal that needs to receive a majority of votes from each of the 3 levels of government in the UCCan (the congregations/pastoral charges, the regional councils and the General Council).

From mid-September to the end of October 2023, the pastoral charge council will work on the land acknowledgement declaration and prepare to vote on this remit.

For the Al Diri family it has been another season of gaining independence while navigating life in Canada by learning English, dealing with car problems, practicing driving, applying for jobs, attaining part time jobs, having wisdom teeth extracted, getting children to and from school, going to doctor's appointments, and preparing for Fatina's grade eight graduation!

First Line for Syria presented at a service at Rosemont United Church in the hopes of gaining some muchneeded support - financially and or physically. The response was one of interest, and we await news as to how they would like to help. Reverend Stacey, and the congregation were most welcoming! On that note, if there is anyone interested in becoming involved in the hands-on work we continue to do with Ahmad and Ruwaida and family or would like to become involved with the next family coming over, please reach out to any of us at First Line for Syria.

The next Al Diri family's application with Immigration Canada has reached the level of "in progress". We have no idea if that means they may be set to arrive in one month, or four, or more...., however, it is a step in the right direction. Furniture is being collected and stored, as we continue to monitor the progress of the application status and fundraise.




