
Easter Message from Clerk of Session, Primrose United Church

Easter Message from the Minister

Hope in the face of hopelessness. That is the message of Easter. And the message of Easter is the core message of the Christian faith.

As we walk through the story of holy week - what is known as 'the passion of Christ' - it is good to remember that those who stood at the foot of the cross, broken hearted and bereft, had no idea of the enormity of the Christianity that would emerge from their sorrow and confusion.

Of the enormous cathedrals that would reach towards the sky, they knew nothing. Of the hospitals and schools and charitable organizations that would be inspired by the ethics of Jesus, they knew nothing. Of the hearts that would be lifted, the kindnesses given, and the graces extended in Christ's name, they knew nothing. And neither, as they wept tears of love mingled with disappointment, could they have imagined the atrocities perpetuated in the name of their gentle, yet bold leader.

How could they? For the ways of the divine are always hidden from us. It is not within our providence to imagine futures that belong to new generations. But because we cannot imagine the wonders that are yet to come, this does not free us from the responsibility of

holding faith with all that we we do know. From the Jewish faith, which was the religious birthplace of Jesus, we are offered this deep wisdom:

"Do not be daunted by the enormity of the world's grief. Do justly, now. Love mercy, now. Walk humbly now. You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it." (from the chapter, *Ethics of Fathers*, in *The Mishnah*, the first text of the Jewish oral law.)

May we take these thoughts to heart, as we walk with Jesus through his celebration of The Passover and all that followed. And may we keep them in our minds as we hold faith with our Jewish and Christian ancestors even as we guide our churches forward to unimagined places of compassion, grace and sanctuary.

of the songs that are to come. Expect the end of the world. Laugh. Laughter is immeasurable. Be joyful though you have considered all the facts.



Practice resurrection.










Photo Directories Are Ready!

Update On Small Hospitality Room at Trinity

As a way of testing out some of our theories in the visioning groups, and strengthening the relationship with two of our partners - Soup Haus and St. John's Catholic Parish who both use the room on a weekly basis - Trinity, with building fund money and a small grant from Embracing the Spirit, has been upgrading their small hospitality room. Replacing the leaking windows and the florescent lighting, insulating the walls, creating proper storage room and making the room welcoming in every way we can imagine, we are creating a template for other spaces in both churches.

The work is scheduled to be finished at the end of April, when we will turn our attention again to the south side of the building and the placement of our historic bell. When both the inside room and the bell are in place, we will plan a come and go tea to both celebrate the conclusion of this hard work and invite potential renters to our newly refurbished space. If nothing is done to change our church, and everything were to continue exactly as it is now, where do you see our church and its congregation 5 or 10 years from now?




