


Thanksgiving Message from Gail Brown, Clerk of Session, Primrose United Church

Our Pastoral Living Faith Story, by Gail Brown, Shirley Farnell, Mary Hawthorne, Ann McAlpine, Fran Braiden

In recent months, a small team from our Pastoral Charge has been writing our 'Living Faith Story'. The Living Faith Story tells all about our Living Faith Community, or in olden days' terms - our churches. This is the new language from the United Church of

Canada, UCC. This document is the preparation needed for posting our demographics, telling others what we do and who we are. It is an important document as we prepare to call a Minister next Dec. 2020. Sadly, Rev. Candice will retire then and we need to secure another inspiring leader. The process can take over a year and a half. We have made an excellent beginning.

As a Living Faith Community, we have prioritized the UCC categories, describing all that we do including Future Goals. We continue to encourage partnerships, to extend comfort and help to the Shelburne and Primrose communities and offer musical concerts and dinners for social evenings. Arrangements have been made for a guest speaker to help us learn about the possibility of a Parish Nurse. Also, we are investigating the possibility of a part time Student Minister for 2020.



Congregants have expressed an interest in offering workshops in the areas of mental health and addictions, which we are planning to do. In the meantime, a support group for youth will be hosted at Trinity on Tuesdays and Thursday after school and we are partnering with the local high school in Shelburne to bring speakers to address mental health with our youth. Other partnerships include: an multi-faith discussion and dinner

group; music lessons for young children and their parents; a series of Peace keeping workshops in Oct. and Nov.; and in the New Year, a breakfast club will be offered early on Tuesdays and Thursdays mornings. Wanting discover how we might use the Meditation Garden in new ways, members from Primrose attended a Spiritual Disciplines Retreat last weekend.

Our 'story' keeps getting busier and busier! This is what we need to do to offer Sanctuary to others and to continue to Embrace The Spirit. There is much to be grateful for this fall.



On Sunday September 8th, both Primrose and Trinity had short services led by the congregation followed by open conversations concerning the forward path of each church. Both gatherings were interactive and lively as members and adherents attempted to articulate the direction they felt the church should be taking, and therefore, the particular leadership that will be needed after Rev. Bist is finished her time here at the Pastoral Charge. Rev. Bist is on a very specific three year contract that allowed her to lead, but does not allow her to stay past this time. This is due to her being ordained in the Presbyterian church. These rules are laid down by the UCC.

Both churches returned again and again to the importance of compassion and serving the larger community, learning to face outward, rather than inward, and offering education in the areas of mental health and addictions.












October 16th & 30th, November 13t,& 27th Managing Conflict as a Life Skill -Partera Local Offers Four Workshops

Often peace is mis-understood as the absence of conflict. Well, that's never going to happen! If we're human and engaged in any way with other human beings, we will find ourselves in conflict.

The question is, how do we address, confront, conflict before it breaks something or someone? Someone might ask, why bother? Because the failure to deal well with conflict ends up with pain, hurt, a work or personal relationship damaged. It can end up in death. We lose sleep; our health is compromised; we duck and dodge rather than dive in.

But it goes further. Social dis-integration begins at home, blossoms further in our schools, our

places of worship, workplaces, in our politics, and into our wars.

In these four workshops, we will be looking at four topics that overlap a fair bit, but each with its distinctive challenge and application of understanding and skills. Conflict is not going to go away. But we can learn ways to work with it, to understand it, and to better negotiate our way through the murky waters of new understandings.

Rev'd LeeAnn McKenna has facilitated trainings around the world in non-violence, conflict transformation, economic literacy, and in Canada and the United States on health equity and cultural humility, anti-bullying and anti-racism, de-colonization and difference, will be offering this series of four workshops every other Wednesday beginning on 16 October. While the sessions will be stand-alones, each session will be drawing from those that proceed it.

The cost per workshop is \$20 at the door or PWYC (pay what you can) including refreshments and all hand-outs. If you're a parent, a teacher, a student, a neighbour, a leader or a follower, a human, you will hear your stories, your questions and your answers in these workshops. Come for the series or the sessions of your choice, interest and passion.

Sunday October 20, Dot Klein, Parish Nurse Coming to Speak



Dot Klein first worked in this area as a VON when she graduated in nursing. All these years later, with much experience serving in rural areas, she has answered the call to parish nursing. On October 20th, Dot comes to speak at both churches about the wonderful work a parish nurse can do in the community as she recognizes and responds to community needs, following in the healing ministry of Jesus.

A parish nurse is a unique combination of a registered nurse and called minister. They would work closely with the lead minister in determining the needs of the congregation and



community, and then set about offering workshops, training, and experiences that would offer compassionate healing. This is a unique ministry that combines physical, mental, emotional and

spiritual wellness.

The visioning groups at both churches are exploring the possibility of having a parish nurse in our pastoral charge. Mary Hawthorne and others have formed a small task force to

investigate this possibility. So, if you have any nursing friends, encourage them to attend this informative Sunday service and see if this is a calling that speaks to them.

Mary Margaret is coming to speak to us about the urgent need for foster homes in our community. She will be speaking about why there is this need, why it is increasing, and how and why you might want to consider offering



Note from the Trinity Visioning Group, Jennifer Crewson

The Visioning Group met to discuss next steps and new projects - we are very eager to test out the possibility of obtaining grants to fund our projects so we will be experimenting with this over the next while. In the meantime we will be putting the finishing touches on the newly renovated You Belong Here room, formally known as the Small Sunday School room. Michael and a group of eager volunteers renovated this room over last winter and spring and we had a grand unveiling of the room and repositioning of the Bell on Sunday May 2, 2019.

This fall in the YBR we are hosting a monthly interfaith gathering, weekly music lessons, a series on conflict, and a speaker from Dufferin Children and Family Services. In the new year we will be teaming up with Youth for Christ and launching a breakfast club, where students and families will receive complimentary breakfast and a bagged lunch so they can thrive during their day.

We are interested in furnishing this room differently than the rest of the church and so we are in the process of costing chairs, window treatments, pieces of technology and art; Wayne Ferrier has generously donated his time and is building a table from locally sourced wood. We are excited to continue with our projects, foster more partnerships and transform our church.



Thanksgiving Financial Report from Dave Hawthorne, Trinity Treasurer

With the completion of the relocation of the church bell to the south side the church and the tuck pointing of the church foundation the stairs project is now nearing completion. The capital building fund has decreased considerably with the above projects and the work that has been done on the "You Belong Here" (hospitality) room. The next things on our list of improvements are replacing the

furnace and the windows in the church office and the minister's office.

As of August 31, 2019 our Trinity operating position shows a surplus of \$2594.00 for the year but our insurance bill remains to be paid. Fundraising has netted approximately \$4000.00 for funeral lunches; the pie sale at the Street Festival slightly over \$900.00 and the strawberry supper around \$3000.00. Many donations of time, effort and food allowed us to make this kind of profit. We would like to thank everyone who helped in any way with these events.



We are looking forward to the Friday, October 18th concert featuring Gary Heaslip and friends for an entertaining evening and our roast beef dinner on Friday, November 1. Hopefully these events will help stabilize our finances. At our annual meeting in February 2019 we set a goal of \$7500.00 for M&S to support the United Church of Canada. As of August 31, 2019 \$3968.00 has been raised.

We continue to form partnerships within the community of Shelburne to enhance the use of our church and would be delighted to have everyone participate in these events.

With Thanksgiving fast approaching let us all realize our good fortune and consider a special

thanksgiving donation to help the work of the church as we celebrate at this special time.
